COLORADO PET OVERPOPULATION FUND



The Colorado Pet Overpopulation Fund (CPOF) is a specific charitable fund established in 2001 by the Colorado State Legislature. The fund exists to work with animal care and control organizations (including pet rescues), veterinarians and local communities to curb pet overpopulation in Colorado. The fund also helps to educate the public about the importance of controlling pet overpopulation. We are glad that we can offer this great program at our hospital to provide quality care for our community population control.

Why spay or neuter your pet?

- Prevents unwanted litters.
- May eliminate many behavioral problems associated with the mating instinct such as roaming, aggression, and marking of territories.
- In female pets, spaying prevents heat cycles.
- Spaying has also been shown to greatly reduce the chance of breast cancer and eliminates the possibility of developing life-threatening uterine infections.
- Contrary to popular belief, spaying or neutering will not make your pet fat. Feeding the correct amount of a balanced diet, and providing regular exercise, will help keep your pet at a healthy weight and prevent obesity related health problems.

Ways to donate to the Colorado Pet Overpopulation Fund:

Generous donations will help fund grants to subsidize spay and neuter of dogs and cats owned by income-qualified residents. These grants are awarded to local coalitions of animal care, animal control agencies and veterinarians.

- Donate on you Colorado Tax form
 - Enter the amount you would like to donate on line 42 of your tax form and the State of Colorado will forward the designated amount to this important fund. Your donation is tax deductible and anonymous
- Purchase an Adopt-a-Shelter-Pet license plate
 - This can be done directly from your local Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV).
 - The cost to purchase the plate is \$80. This includes an initial \$30 donation to the CPOF to benefit the homeless animals, plus the \$50 standard fee for a Special Use License Plate which goes to the State.
